William Wordsworth was one of the greatest English poets and this poem is one of many pieces in which he writes clearly and lovingly of nature and the beauties of flower-land. The last four lines mean that the recollection of beautiful things seen with our own eyes is one of life's greatest joys.

I wandered lonely as a cloud

That floats on high o'er vales and hills,

When all at once I saw a crowd,

A host of golden daffodils:

Beside the lake, beneath the trees,

Fluttering and dancing in the breeze.

Continuous as the stars that shine And twinkle on the milky way, They stretched in never-ending line Along the margin of a bay: Ten thousand saw I at a glance, Tossing their heads in sprightly dance.

The waves beside them danced, but they Outdid the sparkling waves in glee: A poet could not but be gay, In such a jocund company; I gazed—and gazed—but little thought
