And all the way I have been supported by my partner of 44 years Teresa (who is a huge part of the technical side of things for live streaming).

There Teresa and I are building our home and life together which includes a short walk or cart drive to a golf course, some pottery work for me, cross stitching and reading for Teresa, and possible bowling for both of us.


Retirement offers the promise of rest, reading books on a screened-

Edward Thomas Stennett was the first born to Lavina and Thomas Stennett on April 27, 1925 on the farm in the Acton School District near the town of Whitkow, SK. His sister, Iva, and brother, Ray, followed soon after. At the ripe old age of 12, Ed became the man of the house when his father left the family to go north, gold mining, and never returned. Ed did odd jobs for farmers over the years and tried to keep the farm running. Eventually, they had to give up the farm and move to the Meeting Lake area. Ed and a neighbour cut cordwood and fence posts. They also cut ice in the lake, brought it to Rabbit Lake and sold it there. He estimated they cut over 80 tons and hauled it 8 miles to town to store in ice houses. It was hard work but they made enough money to live. Ed got a job in a garage in Rabbit Lake. While he was there, he met Jenny Jones, whom he later married in 1951. They started their life together in Loon Lake where their 3 children, Rob, Len, and June, were

born. Ed owned and operated Ed's Corner Service from 1958 – 1985. He also had his little fix-it shop in his garage at home – fixing lawn mowers and small engines. Ed and Jenny lived happily content in their little log house until Jenny passed in 2009, after 58 years of marriage. He continued to live in his house until the summer of 2021. He then moved into the Loon Lake Special Care home until his passing.

After Ed retired from the garage, he became a lay preacher for 20 years before completely retiring. However, Ed had been involved with the Calvary United Church in Loon Lake for many years. He began to attend Presbytery meetings in 1968 and was on various committees and held the chair position on some of those committees during his thirty plus years of being an active Presbytery member. Besides Presbytery, Ed was very active on all levels of local church governance, chairing many of the Boards. He became a Licensed Lay Worship Leader in 1992 and led worship in all 3 points of the Northern Lakes Pastoral Charge. He also led many of the funeral services in all 3



communities through the years. Ed was a great keeper of the history of the churches. By Christmas 1961, Margaret and John were engaged. A prairie summer wedding followed on July 5, 1963. As a proponent of higher education, Dave packed up the family moved to Madison, New Jersey for a year so he could further his education in Theology at Drew University. Upon returning to Saskatchewan, Dave took the position of minister in the North Portal Pastoral Charge, and the youngest daughter Myrna joined the family.
