STATS FORM COMPLETION and REGIONAL PRESIDENT REPORTS for National UCW.

All Communities of Faith, Areas, and Regions/ Districts UCW (President or Secretary) complete statistics summaries each year.

When all data collection is complete, the summarized numbers for the entire organization are reported at the National UCW Annual General Meeting, giving a picture of UCW across the country for that year.

Regional Presidents also prepare their written reports about all that has happened during the course of the past year in each region. These are presented along with the Statistics Report at the NUCW AGM each September. The 2023 Meeting is set to be held September 18th -22nd at Queen of Apostles Retreat Centre in Mississauga, ON.



COMMUNITY OF FAITH UCWs: Submit their statistics Annually in February/March. **AREA UCW:** Submit their statistics Annually in April/May.

*REGIONAL/DISTRICT UCW: Each Region collects the annual statistics submitted and will summarize the data for the Region, which are then sent on to the National UCW Secretary. Regional Statistics are due in June each year – Now Due!

INDIVIDUAL UCW Members:

Submit their information and dues annually to their Regional/District or Area UCW



representative. You are important to us, so be sure to reach out to be included! If, as a UCW woman, you are living your purpose in your community of faith, but no longer have access to an active UCW Unit, reach out, sign up, and be counted! **How do you Enroll for Individual Membership?** If you do not know the contact for your Region, or in which region you live, ask your minister to connect you to

access the contacts for Region/District UCW. Membership and fees are managed by the Region/District or Area UCW.depending on where you live.

New for 2023, United Church Women (UCW) are making donations to support the programming designed by our *Healing Fund* partners for Indigenous women and children. The primary focus is healing the family through culture and language while meeting individual supports within the program. Through *The Healing Fund* application process, for the next five years, this priority group has been added, designed to specifically support women and children. *The Healing Fund* acknowledges the UCW for their generous blessing and donations to ensure Indigenous women and children receive adequate support and encouragement. The Healing Fund is a grant program which supports healing initiatives in Indigenous communities to address the ongoing impacts of the residential school system. Many survivors name a need for mending, restoring, and celebrating — acknowledging a sense of loss, along with

It is my pleasure to share wonderful news with the National United Church Women of the first Healing Fund project supported by the NUCW community.

As of April 19, 2023, the total amount of gifts received to the Healing Fund from UCW members was **\$5,077.60.** Throughout the Spring 2023 Healing Fund review, our Healing Fund Working Group focused on our

agreement that allows these gifts to support Indigenous Women, Children and Family programming that focuses on the healing of intergenerational trauma affected by Indian Residential Schools.

After carefully reviewing our applicants, our HPWG has selected **Regina Native Outreach Ministries** as the project supported by UCW for their **"Mother & Baby Welcome Bag" program**.

Below is a brief description of their program:

Regina Native Outreach Ministry's Mother & Baby Welcome Bags were created to address the ongoing impacts of intergenerational trauma caused by residential schools. Indigenous mothers giving birth at Regina General Hospital are subjected to racism, discrimination, and violation of rights. Birth alerts, where hospital staff identify a mother as being unable care for her baby, are a continuing practice based on stereotypical and racist assumptions of Indigenous women as incompetent, promiscuous, and bad, which were the same messages inflicted on Indigenous girls through residential schools.

RNOM gifts Indigenous mothers giving birth at Regina General Hospital with a large, reusable bag containing essential items for their newborn baby and themselves. For the newborns there are diapers, baby wipes, diaper rash cream, baby soap, burp clothes, sleeper, onesies, and a handmade blanket (knit, crochet or quilted). For the mothers, there are personal care products like sanitary napkins, breast pads and a small gift such as socks, lip balm and a candle. Also included in the bag is a traditional medicine pouch containing the four traditional medicines of sage, sweetgrass, tobacco and cedar that has been blessed by RNOM's ordained minister with a smudge and a prayer. These welcome bags also include a greeting card with a message of love, respect and caring to let the new mother know she is not alone on her journey and an explanation of how the new mother may use the medicine pouch to connect with her ancestors. In addition, the welcome bags contain an information card with contacts for spiritual support and access to elders. A full description of their program, goals, and objectives [is available*].

We invite you to share this news with NUCW congregations so that members will learn more of the RNOM program and will be able to support future Indigenous Healing programs alike. If you have any further questions or concerns, please feel free to reach me. In Spirit & Unity,

Pamphlets from many of the local and regional women's groups, copies of the NUCW published newsletter - Keeping in Touch Newsletter for UCW, information from Women's Inter-church Council

of Canada (WICC), and Saskatchewan UCW Bursary Fund brochures were distributed.

Beautiful Stained-Glass Window The highlight of the annual meeting was an invitation to take part in the PowWow that was hosted by the local indigenous community for all ages, featuring traditional dancing, singing and story telling. Elder Bunny Ermine extended a welcome that started the meeting in a good way, sharing his story and offering a prayer. On Friday Chief Cadmus Delorme offered deep wisdom and insight on the Indigenous World view. Saturday morning, Elder Liz Settee shared her story and thoughts on what Reconciliation looks like, and Charlene and Russ Burns offered teachings and leadership around Remit 3, regarding the autonomy of the Indigenous Church. On Sunday morning an Elder offered smudging in front of the Calvary United Church entrance, to all who attended worship. The Sermon by Rev. Michele Rowe of Maple Creek gave insight into our future as a church and as humans living in harmony on Mother Earth. She said, "if we are to choose to walk together into the future as Indigenous and non-Indigenous people, newcomers and long-timers, rural and urban dwellers, ministry personnel and lay leaders, young and old, we would do well to follow those who walk softly and humbly, those at home with land and sky and the Creator who made them...for healing to happen, for progress to be made, we must undertake the longest journey of them all, the one between our heads and our hearts". The complete sermon may be read on the Living Skies website under Women's Network.

As we all work to discover a good path together, women in Saskatchewan remind us of an important message from Jesus as written in Matthew 28: "Do not be afraid... I will be with you always, to the end of



the age. "It is hard to "not be afraid" these days. To not be afraid for our youth, our communities, our churches; but we must also believe that "God is with us"; and that "we are not alone" on our journey.




Nakonha:ka: Quebec Regional UCW – **People of the East - Hope and Possibility**

The image also represents hope and possibility, rooted in the age-old blessing of the land and the community, supporting

At a two-day gathering in Moncton, NB, women from across the Maritime UCW were invited to "Tune in to Purpose." Bermuda Synod UCW/UCC: Not many members of our congregations know that Region 15 – part of Maritime UCW, includes the island of Bermuda, home of

Bermuda Synod United Church of Canada. Pictured on the left is a one-cent Bermudian coin, also known as a "hog penny". Original coins were called hog money, minted as 12pence/12p (shilling) coins to the smallest 2p (tuppence), named after the wild boar that roamed the island. At the UCW

60th Anniversary in Sydney last summer, then President of Bermuda UCW, Margaret Ingham, brought with her a stash of 300 personally polished hog pennies and the famous story written by Mary Sumpter, to share with us all. Bermuda wild hogs are reported to have been one of the meats salt-preserved by sea going merchant ships to keep their crews supplied, and are also likely to have been an imported food rashion that saved settlers in Virginia from starvation in 1610 following a hard winter of famine and disease. Bermuda, as an island, has

1610 following a hard winter of famine and disease. Bermuda, as an island, has one continuous ocean coastline, adding this fourth coast to our coastal story for UCW this month. The two UCW units in Bermuda are small (Hamilton Wesley
