...what we will become has not yet been revealed

(1 John 3:2)

I was baptized at Westdale United Church in Hamilton, ON having just barely been born in the 70s (the final 6 months thereof) and soon moved to Milton, ON where my family attended St. Paul's United Church downtown, and, where I am told, I was always a perfectly behaved angel during worship and a model Sunday School student. Camp was a big part of my life from 14 onwards when my Mom signed me up to be a LIT, despite my protests that I did not like public speaking, being silly, or hanging out with kids. I knew 30 minutes into my first day on-site that I had discovered a new part of me I never knew existed.

The Rev Bob Hyde had, either the inspired or ill conceived (not sure which) idea to hand over the leadership of the 7pm

Christmas Eve service to his son Andrew and I when we were 14, having just spent the previous summers as Camp Staff. 31 years later, Andrew is an Ecumenical Campus Chaplain, and I work for the General Council so maybe Bob was onto something. It was my first sense that I had something of my voice to add to this story we hold so dear to our hearts.

The local Missionary Alliance Church with its Youth Room (equipped with a Nintendo 64 and Fooze-ball table) became a second home in faith, and while 45-year-old me doesn't know exactly what to make of 18-year-old me going up front to an altar call (during a Youth Group trip to the Canadian Bible College in Regina of all places) certainly something of the Spirit was moving.

A year at Bible College was followed by University Degrees at Trent University in Peterborough, a short stint as an Outdoor Education and English Teacher and then a trip to Cardiff Wales to study at the Bible College associated with the Charismatic Church I'd been attending.

It was there that things crystalized for me that a Jesus path that was not good news to all beings and that could not honour my queer friends as fully embodying God's glory was not "good enough" and soon upon my return to Canada a fortuitously (or Providential) opening at a United Church Summer Camp lead me back to the church of my childhood, as did an early copy of "A Song of Faith" shared with me by Mother who was preparing to go oversees as a Global Partner. While I wondered in those moments whether leaving religion all together may have been easier, the Jesus story stilled gripped me in wonderfully confusion and occasionally delightfully inconvenient ways.

A role in Youth Ministry at St Paul's Milton, lead to a role animating a church planting turned Fresh Expressions Project opened up space for me to be recognized as a Designated Lay Minster by Halton Presbytery. A live-to-air episode of CBC "Q" recorded when Regina hosted the Junos in 2013 made me take a second look at an ad in the Observer for Knox-Metropolitan United Church and our family embarked on an adventure to Treaty Four Territory. That role allowed me space to find my voice as a minister and bring together many threads including a conviction of the beauty and potency of the local church to be an essential thread in the fabric of a neighbourhood. I am now a bit baffled but excited to offer ministry through a role with the General Council Offices around Strengthening Invitation, humility and confidence in sharing faith. I am grateful to the Camp Communities of Ryerson Camp (on Lake Erie) and Lumsden Beach Camp (in the Qu'Appelle Valley) which embraced cooperative ministries with me and the COFs I served and learned much about making theology practicable and to St Andrew's College where I have been slowly working away on a degree and pondering though reading and writing questions around the intersection of whiteness, spiritual practice, and a vocation of reparation. I treasure fellow conspirators both within and beyond the Church Communities of Regina who have imagined with me.

I currently dwell in the Cathedral Neighbourhood of Regina, SK with Cheryl, Lily, Isla, and, Oliver.



PETER GILMER

I grew up as a PK in Melfort, Saskatchewan. I first felt a call to ministry in the fall of 1982 so ordination is part of an over 40-year discernment process. DARRELL REINE



I was born in England during World War II and evacuated to Canada at the age of six months with my mother, who was British and married to a Canadian soldier. We arrived at my father's farm at Bjelde Cree, Eagle Hills area, South of Battleford in 1945. I attended a one room school until completing grade 8. I graduated high school in North Battleford. I then articled to be a Land Surveyor and was commissioned after spending two winters doing oil exploration for an oil company North of the Arctic Circle in Alaska and the Yukon.

I returned to work for the City of Saskatoon for 6 years as a surveyor and then went to work as an Education Representative

for the Canadian Union of Public Employees for the next 20 years. This allowed me to instruct and empower people to maintain and improve their working conditions. This experience was the first of several that gave me a sense of serving God. While living and working in Saskatoon I served one 3-year term as a Councillor for the city before moving to a farm near Pike Lake and doing construction work. After a few years my partner and I moved to Shell Lake and opened a Hardware & Lumberyard Store.

I received a wake-up call one day and began a journey to became clean and sober. God had to hit me with a two by four. I was baptized in the United Church and through my high school years and young adulthood I felt a pull toward the ministry. After becoming clean and sober I felt the pull even more and I entered into a year of discernment. I became a Designated Lay Minister in 2010 and have served a few communities of faith, starting with Eatonia, then Shellbrook, and finally Big River where I currently serve half-time.

I have always worked with the poor and down-trodden, people who need support, and prisoners. I have worked at establishing a food bank, worked on Government Social Services Review Boards, and have been active in working with the Federal Penitentiary in Prince Albert. I am a visitor through the P2P program, been an escort, and have worked with Parkland Restorative Justice for the last 26 years. I have had the privilege of officiating at a wedding behind the walls and also leading a funeral service behind the walls. My heart has always been in the North and I am trying to live it out in my life and bring others to reconciliation with our Indigenous brothers and sisters. Diaconal was my choice and I praise God for leading me to serve him in this way.

"Those meetings are too far for me to attend". And if that doesn't work: "I'm only half-time". Best of all, is the landscape: the sky; the wind; the miles and miles of grasslands; the coyotes and pronghorn; the communities that understood isolation before the pandemic. Sadly, health facilities are limited in the remote areas of our province, and sometimes you just have to give up the freedom of big space to head back to the crowds.

I give thanks for all the communities that made a place for me over the years. They live the faith. They are signs of resurrection. They are places of grace.
