The Healing Fund - update

Spring of 2023 the Healing Fund Working Group selected the Regina Native Outreach Ministries, "Mother & Baby Welcome Bag" program. The Regina Native Outreach Ministries gifts Indigenous mothers giving birth at Regina General Hospital with a large, reusable bag

containing essential items for their newborn baby and themselves. For the newborns there are diapers, baby wipes, diaper rash cream, baby soap, burp cloths, sleepers, onesies and a handmade blanket (knit, crochet or quilted). For the mothers, there are personal care projects like sanitary napkins, breast pads and a small gift such as socks, lip balm and a candle. Also included in the bag is a traditional medicine pouch contain the four traditional medicines of sage, sweetgrass, tobacco and cedar that has been blessed by Regina Native Outreach Ministries' ordained minister with a smudge and a prayer. These welcome bags also include a greeting card with a message of love, respect and caring to let the new mother know she is not alone on her journey and an explanation of how the new mother may use the medicine pouch to connect with her ancestors. In addition, the welcome bags contain an information card with contacts for spiritual support and access to Elders.

Spring of 2024 the Healing Fund Working Group selected the Fort McKay Metis Nation Association, "Healing in the Kitchen" program from UCW donations. This project's objectives are specific, measurable goals that outline what we aim to achieve through the implementation of our healing workshops and communal dining experiences. The six objectives are:

- 1. Increase access to traditional healing practices: our first objective is to provide community members with access to culturally relevant healing modalities rooted in Metis culture and traditions. By offering workshops on herbal medicine, sweat lodge ceremonies, storytelling, and other traditional practices, we aim to increase awareness and utilization of these healing methods within the community.
- 2. Empower community members to reclaim cultural identity: we seek to empower participants to reclaim their Metis cultural identity and heritage by providing opportunities for hands-on learning and engagement with traditional practices. Through experiential workshops and communal dining experiences, we aim to foster a sense of pride, connection, and belonging among participants.



- 3. Promote holistic well-being: our project aims to promote holistic well-being by addressing the physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual dimensions of health. We will provide workshops that address these dimensions, such as self-care and healthy living, traditional healing from loss, and the medicine wheel and holistic healing, to support participants in achieving balance and wellness in their lives.
- 4. Facilitate Healing from Intergenerational Trauma: one of our key objectives is to facilitate healing from the intergenerational trauma inflicted by the residential school system. Through culturally relevant healing practices storytelling, and communal support, we aim to create a safe and supportive environment for participants to address and heal from past traumas.
- 5. Strengthen Community connections and solidarity: we aim to strengthen community connections and solidarity by providing opportunities for communal learning, sharing, and support. Through communal dinner meals and interactive workshops, we seek to foster a sense of belonging and unity within the For McKay Metis Nation community.
- 6. Evaluate and Improve program effectiveness: finally, we aim to evaluate the effectiveness of our program and make necessary improvements based on participant feedback and outcomes.

List of workshops to be offered throughout the "Healing in the Kitchen" program;

Herbal Medicine and Plant Healing, Healing Practices Through Storytelling, Sweat Lodge Ceremony, Traditional Jigging and Movement Therapy, Medicine Wheel and Holistic Healing, Traditional Healing from Loss, Self-care and Healthy Living, The Role of Youth in the Community, Art Therapy, and Building Healthy Families.

As of May 8, 2024, \$32,169.02 has been raised.

We had Rev. Jen Prince do the worship service and communion as well as installation of officers at the end of the meeting.

Everyone loved the fact that we did everything in the morning. It is the first time that we decided to charge a minimum of \$10.00 per person. It was a wonderful, uplifting morning for one and all!


Plans are underway for the Annual Togetherness Day to be held in Barrie on October 2nd.

Among the 37 registered were women from East Central Ontario Region UCW, our neighbouring EOOR, Maritimes and Pacific Regions and three from Florida. We met by Zoom supported by Karen Wilson (ECORC communications staff) and UCW volunteers who created discussion ideas, led breakout rooms and shared a map of the novel's setting.

Betty shared thoughts about Rebekah's Old Testament life journey and her own writing experience. We shared our reading experience and thoughts about the family relationships in the novel. The evening ending with "Questions for Betty."

In the words of one participant: "I much enjoyed, was enlightened and felt so nourished by this time together." And another: "This time today with Betty was a great gift."

Coming Soon: Then Let Us Sing!

The release of *Then Let Us Sing!* — the United Church's new digital music resource—is getting closer. Final selection of the new hymns and songs has been made, final engraving is in process, and the website and platform is almost ready.

Then Let Us SING! will be The United Church of Canada's most current—and future-focused—source of music for congregational singing and worship planning. Release date is scheduled for this fall as part of the celebrations for The United Church of Canada's 100th birthday.

The project's Material Creation group has been very busy over these last four

years:

- receiving over 1,500 submissions from composers and text writers from across Canada and internationally along with 1,000+ songs and hymns from published sources
- creating a Sampler of about 25 pieces for review by 200 communities of faith (including some UCW groups) in the fall of 2023 and reviewing the feedback
- selecting the final 150+ hymns and songs for the final collection

What are you going to see?

New hymns and songs that use fresh language for God and accessible musical styles; hymns and songs that lift up previously underrepresented racialized, Indigenous, francophone, and LGBTQQITTPA+ and Two Spirit people, as well as people with disabilities, and people of diverse linguistic communities.

The digital platform will include almost all the hymns that we love in *Voices United*, *More Voices*, and our French hymnal *Nos Voix Unis*, plus the previously unpublished Korean United Church collection.

Digitization will provide a lot of versatility for communities of faith: through an agreement with OneLicense.net, communities of faith who subscribe to *Then Let Us SING*! will have *all permissions* for legally copying, printing, projecting, and streaming. The digital nature also means that in the future, more music will be added. For those who prefer to have a book, a hard copy booklet of the new hymns is also planned for 2025.

And there's more. A team co-ordinated by Rev. Phil Wilson has interpreted nearly 20 hymns into American Sign Language (ASL) and langue des signes québecoise (LSQ). These videos will be part of our witness to the wider church and will be made available online.

Workshops and training sessions to introduce *Then Let Us SING*! are being planned for this fall to introduce the music across the country. Keep an eye open for information about events in your area.
