Minutes of Living Skies Regional Council Meeting VIA ZOOM June 4-5, 2021

SESSION 1: Friday June 4, 7:00 pm

OPENING

Tricia Gerhard, Chairperson for the Regional Council Executive, opened the meeting and welcomed everyone, saying that she was glad they had chosen to spend this time together to do the work of the church. She explained that Rob Reed, Convenor for the Annual Meeting, was not able to be present due to pastoral concerns, and she asked that he and his Community of Faith be held in prayer.

INTRODUCTIONS

Tricia introduced Shannon McCarthy, Executive Minister; Jamie Mckay, Regional Executive Assistant and Annual Meeting Recording Secretary; Kent Mohn, Youth and Young Adult Minister; Bev Diebert, Administrative Support; Tracy Murton, Pastoral Relations Minister; Madeleine McLuhan-Myers, Archivist; Heather Dootoff, Finance Administrator; Julie Graham, Minister: Justice and Communications; Darrell Reine, Rob Reed, Hoeun Lee, and Bonnie Morton, Regional Gathering Planning Committee Members; Alan Hall, Executive Officer, Ministry and Employment and General Council Guest; Karen Medland, Office of Vocation Minister; Charlene Burns, Community Capacity Development Coordinator (Western Canada), Indigenous Ministries Circle; and Vicki Nelson, Stewardship Animator (Western Canada).

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF TREATY TERRITORY

Tricia stated the Land Acknowledgement with these words, "We come together this evening from many places across Living Skies Regional Council, places that are on the traditional territories and treaty lands of strong and diverse First Nations and the homeland of the Metis peoples. As we gather, let us respect and honor these traditional lands. Let us pray that as we acknowledge the harms and mistakes of the past, we will be motivated to faithfully move forward in partnerships with our Indigenous siblings and the spirit of reconciliation and collaboration. We are all Treaty People."

PROCEDURAL/ ENABLING MOTIONS 001-2021

That Living Skies Regional Council accept the following Enabling Motions #1-12 for this Regional Council meeting:

- **1. Roll of Regional Council:** that the Roll of the Regional Council for the purposes of the Third (3rd) Annual Regional Council meeting be:
 - i. the members of the Order of Ministry within the bounds served by the regional council; and
 - ii. other ministry personnel in a covenantal relationship with a community of faith within the bounds of the regional council iii. lay members of the regional council are members of the United Church who are not ministry personnel and who are elected by communities of faith. (The Manual 2021, C.1.1 & C.1.2)
 - iv. members-at-large, lay members within the Regional Council who have been appointed members as necessary for the work of the Regional Council by the Regional Council Executive and who have not been elected by their community of faith.
- **2. Corresponding Members:** that all invited guests, registered visitors, and staff be corresponding members of this Regional Council meeting, with voice but not vote.
- **3. The Bounds of the Council:** that the Bounds of the Regional Council meeting be the virtual meeting room and the telephone connections to that meeting space.
- **4. Minimum Number of Members at Meetings:** that the Regional Council may meet only if a minimum number of members is present. If there are 60 or more members, at least 20 members must be present; and there must be at least one ministry personnel and one lay member who is not ministry personnel present. Corresponding members are not counted for this purpose. (The Manual 2021; C.4.3)
- **5. Limits to Debate:** that without the permission of the Council, no member shall speak more than once on any proposal or amendment; and that speeches be limited to two minutes per person on each proposal, except at the discretion of the Convenor.
- **6. Agenda Committee:** that the Agenda Committee for this Regional Gathering be the members of the Regional Council Meeting Planning Committee.
- **7. Rules of Debate and Order:** that the rules of debate and order for Parliamentary debate be those spelled out in Appendix of The Manual 2021 (pages 190-194); and that, for any point not covered in such Appendix, the parliamentary rules accepted in Canada (Bourinot) shall be followed.
- **8. Proposals to the General Council:** that, if the Regional Council does not agree with a proposal where the General Council is the court of action, it will not be sent on to General Council unless a separate motion to send it on is made and passed.
- **9. General Council Commissioners:** that the Living Skies Regional Council Executive will have the authority to elect additional commissioners to the 44th General Council (2022), if necessary, in order to fulfill the slate of

sixteen (16) Regional Council-elected Commissioners, as set by the General Council.

10. Unfinished Business: that unfinished business be referred to the Living Skies Regional Council Executive.

11. Minutes: that the Minutes of the Inaugural Meeting and the 2nd Regional Gathering of the Living Skies Regional Council be approved as distributed in the online docket.

12. Reports: that the verbal and written reports be accepted as presented.

PROPOSAL 1

Proposal 1: Living Skies Regional Council Policy on Justice

Originator: the Rev. SunDo Hyun

The Proposal, presented by SunDo Hyun, called for the Regional Council to:

- establish a Justice Committee to promote justice and equity for all people in all aspects of life and work of the Region Council, with terms of reference to be created by the Executive; and
- that the committee develop and adopt policies on justice based on anti-racist and anti-oppressive principles and the voices from Black, Indigenous, and Peoples of Colour, LGBTQTT2S+ peoples, and people with poverty, disability, mental illness, and more; and drawing on past Saskatchewan Conference and present national church justice, equity, and intercultural policies as relevant.

PROPOSAL 2

Proposal 2: Reinstatement of Funding for Spiritual Care throughout the Saskatchewan Health Authority

Originators: Daryl Woods, Chair of North Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplaincy; and Randy Graham, Chair of South Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplaincy.

The Proposal, introduced by Daryl Woods, called for the Regional Council to:

- issue a formal request to the Saskatchewan Health Authority, the provincial Minister of Health, and the Premier of Saskatchewan for the re-instatement of adequate funding and support for Spiritual Care programs in the provincial healthcare budget; and
- encourage Communities of Faith and members/adherents throughout the Living Skies Region to contact their Members of Legislative Assembly with a request to re-instate adequate funding

and support for Spiritual Care programs in the provincial healthcare budget.

DISCUSS

Proposal 1: Responses to Questions for Clarification

- The Justice Committee would be focused on all areas of justice, but grounded in principles of racial justice; it could work with clusters and networks, and would be accountable to the Regional Council.
- The intention is that it be relevant to the Living Skies Regional Council (LSRC), but committee members do not need to be members of the Regional Council. Only members of Commissions must be LSRC members.
- If the Nominations Committee will need to recruit membership, then information about the number and make-up of Justice Committee members, and a clear mandate will help.
- All committees are corresponding members of the Executive, and can attend and communicate with the Executive regularly.
- It is intended to be a committee, or a better structure would be acceptable to the originators.
- The budget would be part of the Committees Budget.
- The Justice Committee would be accountable to the Regional Council in its reporting, and to the Executive between RC meetings for dayto-day operations
- The Executive would have to determine how Right Relations work would it fit into the Justice Committee mandate. There are networks already doing right relations work.

Proposal 2: Responses to Questions for Clarification.

 The proposed funding would likely be for hospitals in Regina and Saskatoon, where the chaplaincies are centred, but the Proposal references the provincial budget, and so other hospitals should be included.

At the end of the session, the presenters and the delegates were thanked for their work and their input to the discussion.

BENEDICTION

Tricia Gerhard gave a Benediction and thanked those gathered for sharing their weekend with the church, and the session concluded at 9:14 p.m.

SESSION 2: Saturday June 5, 9:30 am

OPENING

Tricia Gerhard, Chairperson for the Regional Council Executive, welcomed the participants.

MORNING WORSHIP

The morning Worship was led by Lorna King and Emily Carr, the South and North Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplains, respectively.

REPORTS

Regional Gathering Planning Committee Convenor

Darrell Reine. Regional Gathering Planning Committee Convenor, chaired the meeting while Tricia Gerhard, Regional Council Executive Chairperson, gave her report.

Recent Executive action included a letter that was sent to the Saskatchewan Provincial Government asking for a ban against conversion therapy in Saskatchewan, with no response as yet. Communities of Faith are encouraged to join the discussions, noting that conversions are still happening in Regina and Saskatoon. An invitation will be coming to Communities of Faith encouraging them to send letters to the provincial government as well.

As follow-up to the last Annual Meeting, the Regional Council is discontinuing assessments for additional Community Ministry funding. A universal Community Ministries Fund has been created to distribute funding equitably to the Community Ministries. The fund will be administered by the Grants Committee. Information about donating to the fund is posted on the Regional Council website, and will be distributed in the *Rambler* newsletter.

More information will be circulated about the work of the Community Ministries, and the delegates were encouraged to share it widely. **Discussion**: the impact on Community of Faith assessments is still being worked out with Erik Mathiesen; Indigenous Ministries funding is self-governed by the General Council Indigenous Ministries and Justice unit, and comes from Mission and Service; It is frustrating to see this separation between community and Indigenous ministries; Communities of Faith are asked to contribute a portion of proceeds all property sales to the Indigenous Ministries and Justice funding system; Indigenous Ministries and Justice is looking at setting up an Indigenous Regional Council.

Tricia Gerhard resumed chairing the meeting, and thanked Darrell Reine for chairing during her report.

Executive Minister

Shannon McCarthy, Executive Minister, began her report by saying how good it was to see everyone, and that she was looking forward to travelling to Saskatchewan again soon.

Shannon thanked Tricia and the Executive for their work over the past year. In spite of meeting via Zoom, which is exhausting, thoughtful and careful consideration was given to all of their work.

The volunteers and ministry personnel, particularly the Nominations Committee, were thanked for carrying out their extremely difficult work during this transition. Former Conference and Presbytery volunteers were encouraged to come back for justice, affirming, and all kinds of Regional Council work that needs their gifts and skills.

Shannon expressed appreciation for the work of the staff: for doing an incredible job at this time, and reaching out to help people in new and different ways: Tracy Murton, Pastoral Relations Minister; Bev Diebert, Administrative Support; Madeleine McLuhan-Myers, Archivist; Kent Mohn, Youth and Young Adult Minister; Heather Dootoff, Financial Administrator; Julie Graham, Regional Minister: Justice and Communication; Vicki Nelson, Stewardship Animator for Western Canada and Jamie Mckay, Regional Executive Assistant.

The delegates were referred to Shannon's written report in the docket: https://livingskiesrc.ca/wp-content/uploads/2021/05/SecB21.pdf
Shannon also referred the delegates to the United Church Website, to view how the General Council has responded to the finding of 215 unmarked graves in Kamloops, BC, including responses and prayers from Moderator, Richard Bott, and Murray Pruden, Executive Minister for Indigenous Ministries and Justice: https://united-church.ca/news/kamloops-residential-school-time-mourning-and-support.

Tricia thanked Shannon for her report and for all of her work over the past year.

Discussion: the rural church is struggling, not caused, but exacerbated by COVID; the General Council is aware of this. Congregations are closing; a large number of churches are without the services of ministry personnel; urbanization is also a factor; Communities of Faith are being supported, especially the Lay Leaders; St. Andrew's College is separately incorporated, and the Regional Council doesn't have authority over their decisions; the Association of Theological Schools approves programming for graduates that are to be ordained.

General Council

Alan Hall, General Council Executive Minister for Ministry and Employment, began his report by thanking the Regional Council for the invitation and opportunity to be part of this meeting, and for the references to the recent discovery of the 215 unmarked graves of children at the Kamloops Residential School. This shocking and incomprehensible news provides a reminder that we have much to explore and reflect on in our history, and that we have much to do for reconciliation.

Appreciation was expressed for Murray Pruden, new Executive Minister for Indigenous Ministries and Justice, and change that will effect steps towards right relations.

Alan asked for prayers for the new General Secretary, Michael Blair, as he responds to so many issues facing the church at this time.

The 44th General Council (2022) will be a virtual meeting, in three sessions: listening in February, discussion in the spring, and decision-making in the summer session.

The development of a strategic plan for The United Church of Canada is moving forward with input from town halls and consultations. The results will be reported to the General Council Executive in the fall, and then to the 44th General Council in 2022. The plan will address the question: What does the church need to do today to be relevant, and meaningful, effective and faithful 10 years from now? Comments can be sent to planning@united-church.ca.

A report to the GC Executive is being drafted with recommendations about rural churches, and practices to support those without ministry leadership. The Office of Vocation is only in its second year, and continues to learn and revise its processes and make improvements to ChurchHub.

Alan encouraged the delegates to support Japhet Ndhlovu, the new Executive Minister for Church in Mission, and expressed appreciation for the academic leadership of John Young, soon to be retiring from the position of Executive Minister for Theological Leadership.

Appreciation was also expressed for the staff, and those in Pastoral Charge leadership, both vocational and lay, for learning new skills and ways to connect during the COVID pandemic. Alan acknowledged that technology is not always available in rural areas, and told the story of one Community of Faith that is distributing weekly rural mail box sermons.

Alan asked that any updates in the work around reviewing the Designated Lay Ministry, Licensed Lay Worship Leaders and Sacramental Elders practices be communicated to him.

At its conclusion, Alan Hall was thanked for his report.

Stewardship

Vicki Nelson, Stewardship Animator for Western Canada, was introduced. Vicki invited the delegates to consider these questions. What is your Community of Faith's mission? What inspires you to stay involved with your Community of Faith? What inspires new folks when they find you? If

money was not object and you had unlimited time to devote to it, what do you dream for your Community of Faith?

Vicki introduced *Called to be the Church: the Journey*, a program for Communities of Faith to intentionally focus on and plan for stewardship. The program is being planned for August, and delegates were invited to contact Vicki directly: ynelson@united-church.ca.

Further questions were considered. When do you ask members of your Community of Faith to give? When was the last time generosity was spoken about as a spiritual practice? How are folks, curious about your Community of Faith, invited in, welcomed and engaged? How do you practice gratitude in our own life? How is generosity within your Community of Faith lifted up and celebrated? How do you feel when you are appropriately seen, acknowledged and thanked? In what ways do you pay that forward? Vicki reminded the delegates to use *Generosity Matters* and *Minutes for Mission* stories and resources, and that, "living a life full of gratitude takes practice and daily effort, but it is so worth it!"

Lydia Gruchy Anniversary

Sandra Beardsall, Professor of Church History and Ecumenics at St. Andrew's College, shared some of her research on Lydia Gruchy, whose 85th Anniversary of Ordination would be celebrated in November, 2021. Lydia Gruchy was the first woman ordained in The United Church of Canada, and in the whole of Canada.

Sandra reflected on Lydia's life, and what it means for the church today. Further details about Lydia Gruchy's life can be found in her biography, With Love, Lydia: The Story of Canada's First Woman Ordained Minister, by Patricia Wotton.

Sandra concluded by leading the delegates in reciting a paraphrase of Psalm 122:

I was glad when they said to me: let us go to the house of God. And now our feet are standing within your gates, the gates of a city bound firmly together.

The people go up, to give thanks to God: there stand the pillars of justice and peace.

For the sake of my siblings, of my friends, I say: "Peace be with you, city of God!

And I will seek your good, O city. I will seek your Good". Amen. Tricia Gerhard thanked Sandra Beardsall for her presentation, and congratulated her on her upcoming retirement later in 2021.

Finance

Heather Dootoff, Financial Administrator, began by bringing greetings from Donna Brown, Regional Council Treasurer, who was unable to be present. Heather reported that 2019, as a year of transition, and 2020, with the impact of COVID-19, were not normal spending years, and that 2021 is raising questions about what might be the new normal. Delegates were referred to the 2020 Financial Statements, posted on the Regional Council web site, which show that the operating revenue was

Regional Council web site, which show that the operating revenue was over-budget, while expenses were less than budgeted, leaving a net surplus.

Heather reported that virtual meetings were being held between *Edge* and Mission Support-receiving Ministries to find ways to strengthen their funding capacity in the face of diminishing Mission and Service funds. Delegates were invited to visit https://livingskiesrc.ca/resources/funding/ to find out about available funding and resources.

Heather concluded her report with a reminder that Community of Faith statistics need to be submitted through ChurchHub.

Nominations

Susan Reed, Nominations Committee Convenor, referred the delegates to the <u>full report</u> in the meeting docket.

Susan offered a word of thanks to those who said "yes" to taking on new roles; to those who considered the possibility even if the answer was "no"; and to all those who have given of their time, energy, gifts and wisdom to the Regional Council.

She advised that the primary role of the Nominations Committee is to fill vacancies, and that currently there were fourteen vacancies; plus members needed for any new committees; plus Pastoral Relations Liaisons. Information about all of these opportunities is posted on the Regional Council web site: https://livingskiesrc.ca/governance-admin/nominations/.

There are two processes for nominations: to ask people directly, and to seek submissions through the <u>Expression of Interest</u> form. At present, only self-nomination is available, so delegates were encouraged to talk to others about the opportunities, referring them to the Expression of Interest form or to contact the Nominations Committee for more information: lsrcnominations@gmail.com.

Susan concluded her report by advising that there were three vacancies on the Nominations Committee, and invited the delegates to consider joining this fun group, which would be more effective with six members rather than the current three.

Commissioners to the 44th General Council

Susan Reed outlined the process of the Nominations Committee, including considerations of General Council and Regional Council Executive mandated parameters, balances for diversity, living into being intercultural, and including all kinds of people.

It was reported that the Nominations Committee was responsible to produce a slate of nominees for 17 General Council Commissioners and 5-6 Alternate Commissioners, to include:

- 1 Commissioner who is ex-officio, the Chairperson of the Regional Council;
- 1 Youth Commissioner to be chosen by the Youth and Young Adult Community (YAYAC); and
- 15 Commissioners selected from the applications submitted to the Nominations Committee; and

Biographies of the nominees for GC Commissioners were not available publicly, but the delegates were assured that the Nominations Committee was very careful in its work to produce the following slate:

It was moved by Susan Reed and seconded by Jeanette Warrian that the above slate of Commissioners be approved by the Living Skies Regional Council. The motion was carried.

The Nominations Committee was thanked for its very important work.

Charlene Burns, Community Capacity Development Coordinator for Western Canada, Indigenous Ministries and Justice, gave her regrets for the remainder of the meeting.

SESSION 3: Saturday June 5, 1:30 pm

OPENING

Tricia Gerhard, Chairperson for the Regional Council Executive, welcomed the delegates back for the final session of the $3^{\rm rd}$ Annual Meeting of the Living Skies Regional Council.

The full revised text of both Proposals can be viewed <u>here</u>.

DECIDE:

The two proposals introduced on Friday evening were discussed in preparation for decisions.

Darrell Reine, Chairperson for the Regional Gathering Planning Committee, introduced the Proposals and reported on the feedback received overnight and any revisions that were made.

PROPOSAL 1: 002-2021

That Living Skies Regional Council establish a Justice & Equity Committee to promote justice and equity for all people in all aspects of life and work of the Region Council, with the size of the committee and terms of reference to be created by the Executive. Terms of reference will include but not be limited to:

- That the Justice & Equity committee be able to ask for the creation task groups as needed to focus on particular justice issues (eg. Anti-racism)
- That there be a focus on education and resources for communities of faith
- That the committee encourage the formation of relevant networks and clusters

That the committee develop and recommend policies to the Regional Council Executive on justice based on anti-racist and anti-oppressive principles and the voices from Black, Indigenous, and Peoples of Colour, 2SLGBTQIA+ peoples, and people with the lived experience of poverty, disability, mental illness, and more; and drawing on past Saskatchewan Conference and present national church justice, equity, and intercultural policies as relevant.

The proposal received general agreement, with the particular focus on racial justice/anti-racism. The need for a committee was outlined: a place

where clusters and networks can connect, and a body to foster the development of clusters and networks around specific focus areas in order to propose justice and equity policies for the Regional Council.

Moved: Darrell Reine Seconded: Hoeun Lee.

CARRIED

PROPOSAL 2: 003-2021

That Living Skies Regional Council issue a formal request to the Saskatchewan Health Authority, the provincial Minister of Health, and Premier of Saskatchewan for the re-instatement of funding and support for Spiritual Care programs in the provincial healthcare budget; and, That Living Skies Regional Council encourage Communities of Faith and members/adherents throughout Living Skies Regional Council to contact their Members of Legislative Assembly with a request to re-instate funding and support for Spiritual Care programs in the provincial healthcare budget.

The Proposal received general agreement. Suggestions included the need for funding for all people of Saskatchewan and not just in Saskatoon and Regina. This proposal speaks to provincial funding for all people of all faiths. The Executive will work with the originators to prepare a brief that goes to the government. Adjusting the Proposal to make it an ecumenical/interfaith request would change the intent of the originators, however, the Executive can explore that further in consultation with the Chaplaincy Boards. All of the feedback will be provided to the Executive as they create the brief and prepare the package to help Communities of Faith respond to the Proposal.

Discussion: the brief will also be presented to the opposition; health determinants outline social determinants, including spiritual care, so this may be future work for a Justice Committee if the province doesn't have funding, and it is larger than a chaplaincy issue; contact with other denominations and ecumenical partners doing the same work is under purview of Executive follow-through; a sample letter will be part of the information for Communities of Faith; Chaplaincies are working with *Edge* to help chaplaincies create sustainable funding, and they can apply for Mission Support funding; it needs to be clear that this is about broad spiritual care; support is also needed for chaplains and leaders from all faith communities; denominational chaplains vs. spiritual care for all with a spirit was explained.

ANTI-RACISM LEARNING TIME

Darrell Reine began this time for learning by saying, "I am a racist", and reminding the delegates that there is lots of work ahead for us to do. An example that makes this clear is the continued struggle of the Board of Vocation to find diversity for the Board and its Committees.

A video presentation from Michael Blair was shown, with his reflection on the importance of racial justice work for the Christian community. The Table has become a central symbol of the Christian tradition. Some only allow those who fit certain criteria to join. In the United Church, we affirm that the table is open to all, invited by the Lord who invites all people, as a symbol of community and hospitality. The open table is an opportunity to explore our understanding of justice and inclusion. Attending to who is at the table. who is missing, who cannot participate, and how we justify the make-up of the table, invites us to ask questions about our blinders. This is where the conversation about race becomes significant. We need to question where we are blinded and what assumptions we are making. This is critical to our fundamental understanding of an open table and our identity of being a just and inclusive church.

Time was given for personal reflection on these questions:

- Who is present at the Table of Racial Justice?
- Who is missing?
- Why are some present, and some missing?

In plenary, the delegates considered these questions:

- How would you engage these questions in you Community of Faith or ministry setting?
- What resources have been helpful to you? This discussion is just the tip, need to encourage one another to work towards right relationship with one another.

At the conclusion of the discussion, Tricia Gerhard led a prayer for recentring.



that I would be able to serve in some capacity in a governmental organization. Upon graduating there were little opportunities for employment. As a result, I worked a series of odd jobs until I gained meaningful employment with the Saskatoon Public Library, where I worked for a number of years.

I enrolled in the MDiv Program at St. Andrew's College, where the amazing faculty provided me with the necessary knowledge and skills to prepare me for ministry. Growing up on an acreage in a farming community near Edmonton, Alberta, Brian learned early about making do with what was presented to him, and fixing whatever was broken. Those early learnings helped him throughout his several careers, first as Regional 4-H Specialist with the government of Alberta, then as Social Planning Director for the City of Airdrie. The call to ministry came mid-career, and he attended St. Andrew's College in Saskatoon, gaining his M.Div. in 2000.

Born and raised in Winnipeg, MB, I have remained an unrepentant Blue Bomber football fan for all these many years. Thank you to the members of Rider Nation for their hospitality and *good-natured* ribbing of this stranger from a strange land who has sojourned among you this last while.

My home church was Fort Garry United, in Winnipeg. There, as a youth and young adult, I heard the gospel preached; experienced from others the gift of Christ-like acceptance even as I sometimes struggled with self-acceptance; was invited and given the opportunity to offer leadership in Sunday School, youth ministries, and the occasional worship service;

and there I found friends, mentors and role models aplenty in Christian discipleship and service.

I am a graduate of Winnipeg's Vincent Massey Collegiate '74; received a BA from the University of Manitoba '85; and received a Certificate in Ecumenical Studies from the Graduate School of the World Council of Churches, Bossey, Switzerland, '83-'84; Then, returning to St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon, where I had begun studies in '80, I graduated with an MDiv in '85.

I was fortunate to experience a year-long internship with the people of Knox UC, Roblin, and Tummel UC, in Manitoba. I had fought the call to ordained ministry, for many years. But, despite my resistance, these people were strong and insistent in their critiques and affirmations. Through them and by the

grace of Christ, regarding this persistent call from God and the Church, I came to a place of peace within that I had not known before. I also met and married Michele Kines, of Roblin. This has been a lifelong blessing for me and, hopefully, not a total disaster for her.

Ordained by what was then the Conference of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario '85, I was settled on the Gilbert Plains-Ethelbert Pastoral Charge in Manitoba. There I served for four years '85-'89, and learned so much from these saints about church life and community dynamics. The joys and challenges, the ups and downs, both, were a life-changing and ministry-shaping gift. Fond memories remain of those in the youth group, at youth retreats, and in confirmation classes which I lead. Glenna Beauchamp, minister of Knox UC, Roblin, and Tummel UC and Supervisor of my internship in '82-'83, who quietly, compassionately and strongly embodies pastoral presence in community, and who graciously made room in both the congregation and pulpit for one who had much to learn.

As has been said, it is a great gift to have our lives caught up in something larger than our lives. So it is that, as I retire officially, I thank God and the Church for this great gift that keeps on giving.

MATHIAS ROSS



Looking back, whether 'moving' has been in my genes or whether 'choosing' played a more determinative role still remains unresolved! The early move from Malaysia, where I was born to parents of Indian origin, to India was just the start. The opening for ministerial training at The United Theological College, Bangalore -- which was thrice the distance away from a regional seminary -- happened because I was awarded a scholarship at UTC. A quick invitation from North India was the reason for transferring my membership in the Church of South India to become a minister of the Church of North India, and I served St. Paul's Church, Pune for eight and a half years. The choice/decision-

making part of me got activated at this point when my passion to do doctoral study in Theology resurfaced. That took me to New College (University of Edinburgh), where I did my research in critically evaluating Paul Tillich's theological approach to Religious Pluralism. On completing my Ph.D., I was invited by my former teacher in UTC who had then become Principal of Bishop's College, Calcutta to join the faculty. Largely, these moves happened quite naturally.

Ecumenical relations and scholars (including from Canada) coming to give lectures in theological colleges in India, helped me come to St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon in the academic year 2006-7 on a sabbatical and teach a couple of courses. This possibility developed with efforts on my side, which was responded to with interest and generosity on the part of St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon. After the Sabbatical I returned to India and became the Director of Christian Studies at Madras Christian College (mainly an Arts and Sciences college). In addition to fulfilling the normal duties, I organised inter-disciplinary seminars particularly in the areas of inter-faith and peace, and laid the groundwork for the Centre for Peace Studies, which was inaugurated three years later.

Along with the 'move' force at work, my interfaith interest which gained prominence in my thinking since my doctoral study years, also became a forceful thread that connected me with Saskatchewan. In April 2007 at a Conference organised by Multifaith Saskatoon and the City of Saskatoon, I had the opportunity to present a short talk on "Sustainable Common Future and Faith" as a panelist. And in May 2007 I presented a paper titled "Community Praxis and Inter-religious Dialogue in Contemporary Religious Formation", at the Canadian Theological Society's Annual Conference. My interest in theology and inter-faith also led me to express my interest and serve on The United Church of Canada's "Theology, Inter-church and Inter-faith Committee" from 2012 to 2018.

Becoming part of The United Church of Canada involved a deliberate choice. And I am so grateful that my special last years of ministry serving the pastoral charges of Grasslands, Davidson and Carlyle and being part of wider church Annual Meeting gatherings, conferences and workshops had a renewing effect on me. The people, the events, and opportunities for working together resulted in immense learning experiences and personal and professional growth. The last decade of my career was not a winding down, but one where I was forced to experience and articulate transformational change that is meaningful to our given contexts.

To continue to be part of the United Church's mission in congregational settings and in community in the years ahead is my desire. For now, I am happy to serve on the Western Intercultural Ministry Network's Executive, which meets online almost every month.

Ronald Murray Evans

March 30, 1926 - October 1, 2020



Ronald Murray Evans passed away quietly on October 1, 2020 at City Hospital, Saskatoon, SK, in the company of his son Aaron.

Dad was born in Kenaston, SK on March 30, 1936. He grew up on a farm, in "the hill country" of the Chatham District, 14 miles east of town. The son of Alex and Gladys (Paxman) Evans, dad attended Chatham's one-room school before finishing high school in Kenaston. He graduated from the U of S with a B.A. and from St. Andrew's College with a Bachelor of Divinity. Dad met mom, Norma (Poole), at a church summer camp. Mom later attended the U of S where their courtship continued. They were married in 1962, "his good fortune beyond measure". Dad was ordained in the United

Church in 1961 and served four years as the United Church Minister in Rocanville, SK. They moved to Berkeley, California, where dad graduated with a Master of Divinity from the Pacific School of Religion in 1968. Later certified as a supervisor in clinical pastoral education, he worked for 5 years as the chaplain at Kings View Mental Health Center in Reedley, California and 19 years as the Director of Pastoral Services at RUH in Saskatoon. With the exception of four years in the Rocanville parish, dad's working life was spent as a chaplain and teacher in psychiatric and general hospitals in Houston, Reedley, and Saskatoon. In another life, "he would ask to have the courage to be an actor or join the circus; as it was, he got only as far as the church".

Dad never displayed the three university degrees he earned. Rather, what decorated his offices were his diploma in sausage making, a plaque for fire eating and a certificate for graduating from clown school. Dad's alter-ego, Yitzak the Clown, was born after a week at clown school. Yitzak would later appear at RUH, making balloon animals for patients on various wards. In keeping with this spirit, dad left gainful employment at 55 so he could "learn to write". Dad felt tremendous satisfaction for creating a newsletter The Sourdough Bagel, writing three books Coming Home: Saskatchewan Remembered, Letters from the Sourdough Bagel: Confessions of a loner who like company, and When the Bartender Dim the Lights: Storytelling after 80. Dad also produced one CD, You Can See for Miles, a collection of his storytelling accompanied by Barry Luft on banjo. In the last few years, dad learned how to draw and paint, producing many images of hills, barns and barbed wire fences.

A few years after he retired from RUH, mom and dad moved to the Village of Shields at Blackstrap Lake. Mom and dad developed and fostered many new friendships during their 20 years at Shields, most of which endure to this day. During their time at Shields, mom and dad were part of a number of committees aimed at beautifying the Village of Shields. Dad later received a Volunteer of the Year award from the Province of Saskatchewan for the time and effort he spent improving the community of Shields.

Ron was predeceased by his parents, his brother Ross (Elizabeth) Evans in 2012 and sister Norma (Fred) Fulton in 2020.

A loving father, devoted spouse and loyal friend, dad will be missed. Ron is survived by his wife Norma, daughter, Suzanne and son, Aaron, daughter-in-law Melissa, and grandchildren Jackson, Harrison, and Madeleine. "To them all I owe a great debt, having been loved by them and learning to love in turn."

Allan Shaw

June 28, 1931 - February 2, 2021



With Allan was born June 28, 1931 on a farm in Holland Township Grey County Ontario. Allan famously recounts the story that it was a Sunday afternoon and his dad said he found him in the cornfield beside the house!

He grew up in and around Holland Centre, attending school at Holland Centre public school and Markdale High School. After completing Grade 13 he was accepted for a teaching position at Mono Township near Orangeville, Ontario. In the 1950s he commuted between his father's farm and Moggie School where he taught while attending summer courses at Toronto Normal school to obtain a first class teaching certificate.

As a young man, Allan would work the summers away from the farm to raise extra money. Allan also had other interesting jobs, including working the rail

lines for CPR as a section hand and as a milkman with Scenic City Dairy, Owen Sound. Allan also drove taxis, and had many funny stories to tell of those adventures.

In the fall of 1952 Allan began studies for his B.A. at Victoria University Toronto. During his three years of study he was a weekend supply minister at the Temple Hill Pastoral Charge in Grey County, Ontario. It was during this time he met and fell for a young woman who would be his future wife, Joan Patricia Smith. Allan graduated in 1955 from Emmanuel College with a Bachelor of Divinity, and was ordained to the United Church ministry on June 1, 1958.

Allan's first assignment brought him to the Saskatchewan prairies where he took on the Pastoral Charge in Landis. Three years later he relocated to the Pastoral Charge in Unity. He and Joan were married in 1961 and began their married life in Unity, spending nine happy years, and where their three children, Judy, Jeff and Sandi were born.

Allan had an interest in flying and during his years in Unity he obtained a private pilot's license. He volunteered and was accepted for the Alert Bay Marine Mission in British Columbia. The young family moved to Alert Bay and Allan flew float planes. This ministry was fundamental to the culturally diverse remote communities.

In 1972 the family returned to Saskatchewan and he accepted a call to the Nipawin and Codette Pastoral charge where he remained active for twenty-five + years. Allan was appointed to the rank of Captain in Chaplain Services of the Canadian Armed Forces where he received training for two Citabria gliders. In 1983 Allan turned his energies into counseling and registered in a clinical pastoral education course at North Dakota State Mental Hospital in Jamestown and included three months of training at University Hospital, Saskatoon. Allan returned to Nipawin as the School community counsellor and began private counseling out of his home as well as being a supply minister for Ridgedale, Alysham and surrounding communities.

Allan loved music. He mentions that highlights of his career included directing the Intermediate Choir in Unity for seven years. They sang in a number of music festivals for several churches and communities. Allan wouldn't hesitate to stop and play a few tunes every time he passed a piano. After he retired, he played keyboards for the famous 'No Name' band.

Allan also enjoyed coaching a young lady's hockey team in Nipawin which he said was a genuine reward for him. Allan had many other interests and anything he pursued he did with a passion. He loved photography and formed the Photography Club of Nipawin. He was involved with the Boy Scouts and told many stories of his adventures. He also was involved with and led many youth groups. He loved watching sports, including skating, curling, and of course the Saskatchewan Roughriders. In the later years he relished traveling to Manitoba to watch his grandson play a variety of sports and attend every Christmas concert.

Allan drew much pleasure from his volunteering – it was an integral part of his sense of community and his desire to help others. Some of the groups he was involved with include the Lions Club, the Rotary Club, and the Legion. Allan was made an honorary member of the Rotary Club, and was bestowed the Nipawin's Citizen of the Year in 1984.

Allan has spent a lifetime in the service of his ministry and his community. In recognition of his achievements, in 2020 Allan was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Divinity from St. Andrew's College at the University of Saskatchewan.

Allan's family was the most important thing in his life. He showed great interest in the pursuits and endeavors of his children and grandson. He was always there to support, give guidance, extol his wisdom and share his love.

Allan will be lovingly remembered and sadly missed by his wife, Joan, his daughters Judy (Tim), Sandi (Dean), his son Jeff; his grandson Blair, his sister Noreen (Ken) as well as generations of nieces, nephews, and cousins. He is pre-deceased by his parents Thomas Farley Shaw and Mary Ann McMullen, his brother Stewart and his niece Lynn, Alonzo and Hawthorne Smith, Gordon and Eveline Lennox, Ted Smith, Barb Lennox, and Bill Lennox.



Patricia Joan was born in Moosomin, Saskatchewan July 5, 1936 to RCMP Constable Henry (Harry) Sellers Casswell and educator Phyllis Aileen Brown. Harry and Phyllis, with daughters Joan and Beverly, would subsequently live in a variety of communities that included Kipling and Craik, and then Estevan where Joan and Beverly would receive their high school education.

In 1954 Joan enrolled in the City Hospital School of Nursing in Saskatoon. She graduated in 1957 and became a Registered Nurse. On September 16, 1958, at Grace United Church, Saskatoon, she married Walter Farquharson, a theological student at St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon. From September 1960 until June 1961 they

lived in Edinburgh, Scotland, where Walter attended New College at the University of Edinburgh and served as an assistant minister at Morningside Parish Church. Their firstborn child, Scott, was born October 10. Joan's primary focus for that year was learning the skills of parenting.

In July 1961 Joan and Walter moved to Saltcoats, Saskatchewan where Walter had been "settled" as a minister of The Saltcoats-Bredenbury Pastoral Charge of The United Church of Canada. Saltcoats would become home and here Joan and Walter raised their family of four - Scott, Michael, Catherine and Stephen. Life revolved around parenting and active involvement in church and community.

Joan's parents lived with an emphasis upon service and Joan had been attracted to nursing as an avenue of service to community and to individual members of the human family. Her attraction to nursing was inspired in part by the example of family members.

As a nurse, Joan was quick to recognize a patient's needs and changes in their symptoms and their responses to treatments given. She was a compassionate and astute listener. As a nursing manager, Joan functioned as a team-builder, professional and capable, and always as a champion and advocate for care-givers and for those receiving care.

During this time (1990-1992) Joan joined Walter, who was serving as Moderator of the United Church, in extensive travels to congregations and church gatherings across Canada and to partner churches in Zambia, South Africa, Cuba and Jamaica. This, often meant requests from local groups to meet specifically with her or to apprise her of some special projects or concerns. Her ability to meet others with compassion and empathy was quickly recognized.

Over many years Joan partnered with Walter to offer workshops in a variety of areas that included: Celebrating and Honouring Your Relationship as a Couple; Dealing with Grief and Helping Grievers; Spiritual Practices; The Enneagram - Tool for Understanding Self and Relationships. In the local church, she was involved at different times in CGIT, Youth Groups, Music Ministry, Bible Studies, Prayer Groups, and Explorations of Faith. Most recently that local involvement saw the initiation of a Prayer Shawl ministry - and in knitting and crocheting shawls, scarves and lap rugs for that ministry.

In the 1990's, Joan participated in a Spiritual Direction/Ignatian Pathway program at the John Paul II Centre in Regina and, on the completion of a two-year program, was recognized as a Spiritual Director within the Archdiocese of Regina.

For several years she and Walter operated Blue Heron House, Bed and Breakfast and Retreat, hosting group retreats and programs and providing opportunity for individual retreats.

Community involvements were many, and included the Agricultural Society; Community Beautification Group; Yellowhead Flyway Birding Trail Association (especially the Summer Student Program); fund-raising for the Community Hall Refurbishing Project. As part of the Hall Project, Joan designed the unique Saltcoats Community Tartan, officially recognized by the Scottish Tartan Registry.

Throughout her life, Joan was a lover of the natural world, especially the world of trees, prairie landscapes, birding, seeking out native wildflowers. From her days in high school Joan was recognized as having a love for learning, a questioning mind, and a passionate commitment to core values that included justice-seeking, practicing compassion, living with a profound gratitude for gifts, opportunities and connections experienced in each day given us as children of God, part of creation and as part of a diverse and rich family of humankind.

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Independent Auditor's Report

To the Executive of Living Skies Regional Council

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Living Skies Regional Council (the "Council"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2020 and the statement of operations and statement of changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Institute as at December 31, 2020 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Council in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other Matters -

We have not audited, reviewed or otherwise attempted to verify the accuracy or completeness of the schedule on page 15 of the Council's financial statements.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Council's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Council or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Council's financial reporting process.



Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Council's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Council to cease to continue as a going concern.

1. Nature of the Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

The Living Skies Regional Council (the "Council") is composed of Communities of Faith of The United Church of Canada within the Province of Saskatchewan. The Regional Council of The United Church of Canada is a decision making body responsible to serve and support Communities of Faith within its bounds and provide necessary oversight. The Council is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. It is exempt from income taxes under section 149(1) of the Income Tax Act.

The purpose of the Council is:

- Provide support advice and services to Communities of Faith in the areas of human resources, property, archives, leadership training.
- Provide oversight of Communities of Faith and supporting them in their life and work and ensure compliance with the policies and polity of the United Church.
- To ordain and commission members of the order of ministry, recognize Designated Lay Minister, and celebrate admission and re-admissions into the order of ministry.
- To speak both pastorally and prophetically while providing education and advocacy on issues that affect the health of our communities.

Basis of Accounting

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Fund Accounting

A portion of the monies received by the Council may only be used for specific purposes and accordingly are reflected in separate funds within the accounting records. While individual bank accounts are not maintained for these restricted pools, long-term investments are apportioned to fund these. Permanent transfers are recorded as transfers in the net asset accounts.

The General Fund reports those revenues and expenses related to the operations of the Council office.

The Designated Fund reports the revenues and related expenses of externally or internally restricted programs carried on or administered by the Council and are identified in the schedule of changes in designated funds.

For the year ended December 31, 2020

1. Nature of the Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Revenue Recognition

The Council follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions related to general operations are recognized as revenue of the General Fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. All other restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate designated fund.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the period for which the assessment is made based on the approved budget of the Council.

Grants and Assessments - These revenues are recognized as revenue in the period for which the assessment is made based on the approved budget of the Council.

Royalties, lease, and rental income - These revenues are received from Vermillion Energy Inc, Spartan Energy Corporation, Pemoco Ltd, and Crescent Point Resources Partnership and are recognized as revenue when received.

Interest - Interest revenue is recognized as income when the Council becomes entitled to such earnings.

Event fees - These revenues are recognized in the year the related event occurs.

Donations - Donation revenue is recorded when received. Donation revenue received for specific purposes is restricted and will be used at the discretion of the Council. The Council's practice is to allocate these funds as per the donor's request.

Capital Assets

Capital assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. Capital assets are amortized using the straight-line method over 5 years.

A full year of amortization is taken in the year after addition.

1. Nature of the Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, financial assets with actively traded markets are reported at fair value, with any Unrealized gains and losses reported in operations. All other financial instruments are reported at cost or amortized cost less impairment, if applicable. Financial assets are tested for impairment when changes in circumstances indicate the asset could be impaired. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale or issue of financial instruments are expensed for those items remeasured at fair value at each statement of financial position date and charged to the financial instrument for those measured at amortized cost.

Post Retirement Benefit Plan

The employees of the Council participate in a defined benefit pension plan administered nationally by The United Church of Canada. Defined contribution plan accounting is applied to this multi-employer contributory defined benefit.

Contributed Services

The Council benefits greatly from the work of volunteers who contribute countless hours of service to enable the Council to fulfill its mandate. Because it is not possible to determine the fair value of these services, they are not recognized in these financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from management's best estimates as additional information becomes available in the future.

7. Pension Plan

Retirement benefits for employees of the Council are provided through the pension plan of The United Church of Canada (the "Plan"). The Plan is a multi-employer pension plan which provides pensions for members of the Ministry Personnel and lay employees of the Offices of the General Council, Regional Council, or Community of Faith of The United Church of Canada. The Plan is a contributory defined benefit pension plan which is financed by contributions from participating employers and employees, and by the investment earnings of the Plan. The Plan is registered under the Pension Benefits Act, (Ontario), Registration #0355230.

At the date of the last actuarial valuations and publicly available financial information, there were no unfunded liabilities related to either past service or to amendments to the Plan.

During the year, the Council made employee contributions to the plan of approximately \$15,016 (\$22,212 in 2019).

8. Uncertainty of COVID-19

The global pandemic, COVID-19, has disrupted economic activities and supply chains. It has also impacted the Council's operations and, in particular, its ability to support local Communities of Faith. Although temporary and given the dynamic nature of these circumstances, the duration of the business disruption and its financial impacts cannot be reasonably estimated at this time. The Council's ability to pay for its operating costs depends on its ability to continue to receive grants, redeem its investments and maintian cash flows for operations.

9. Internal Transfers

The Executive authorized the transfer of funds in the amount of \$152,946 from the Operating Fund to Internally Restricted Funds.

10. Financial Instruments

The Council is exposed to different types of risk in the normal course of operations. The Council's objective in risk management is to optimize the risk return trade-off, within set limits, by applying integrated risk management and control strategies, policies and procedures throughout the Council's activities.

For the year ended December 31, 2020

10. Financial Instruments (continued)

(a) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument fails to discharge an obligation and causes financial loss to another party. Financial instruments that potentially subject the Council to significant concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash and bank, investments and accounts receivable. The Council is not exposed to significant credit risk as the accounts receivable have typically been paid when due, and investments are diversified.

(b) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: interest rate risk, foreign exchange risk and other price risk.

(c) Interest Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Council is not exposed to significant interest rate risk as its cash and cash equivalents are held in short-term investments or variable rate products.

(d) Foreign Currency Risk

The Council is not exposed to significant foreign currency risk as it does not have any financial instruments denominated in foreign currency and the number of transactions in foreign currency are minimal.

Other price risk is the risk that the value of an investment will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual investment or factors affecting similar financial instruments traded in the market. The Council limits its exposure to other price risks by investing in low risk investment vehicles.

11. Comparative Amounts

PROPOSAL NO. 1

Title: LIVING SKIES REGIONAL COUNCIL COMMITTEE AND POLICIES ON JUSTICE

1. What is the issue?

We believe God is calling us to:

- commit ourselves to becoming an intercultural community.
- move toward anti-racist community.
- practice the life and work of the Regional Council with sensitivity of justice.

2. Why is this important?

- The United Church of Canada has its vision of becoming an intercultural and inclusive community with strong sense of justice and equity for all people both within the church and in wider society.
- There has been increasing awareness of racial justice in the wake of the movements of Black Lives Matter & Indigenous Lives Matter and also a sharp spike in anti-Asian hate crimes these days.
- The United Church of Canada has made a commitment to becoming an anti-racist denomination ("Towards an Anti-Racist Denomination", the 43rd General Council in June 2020), and hired a staff for the position of Anti-Racism and Equity Lead in the General Council Office to engage with anti-racist practices in all parts of the church.
- In our Region, St. Andrew's College in Saskatoon has recently adopted its own Policy on Justice that articulates its commitments, practices, and framework for understanding in the College's ongoing effort to engage in education and action toward justice in all of its own practices. Outreach and Collaboration' is part of the practices framed in the policy which makes it possible to collaborate with partners in our Region on the issue.
- It is important to set policies that provide direction and principles on the issue to all governing bodies (including Living Skies Regional Council Executive, Commission, and Committees), communities of faith, clusters, networks, and individuals in our Region.

That the committee develop and recommend policies to the Regional Council Executive on justice based on anti-racist and anti-oppressive principles and the voices from Black, Indigenous, and Peoples of Colour, 2SLGBTQIA+ peoples, and people with the lived experience of poverty, disability, mental illness, and more; and drawing on past Saskatchewan Conference and present national church justice, equity, and intercultural policies as relevant.

PROPOSAL NO 2

Title: RE-INSTATEMENT OF FUNDING FOR SPIRITUAL CARE THROUGHOUT THE SASKATCHEWAN HEALTH AUTHORITY

Originating Body: North Sask. Hospital Chaplaincy & South Sask. Hospital Chaplaincy

1. Statement

As the official boards & ministry personnel of the South Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplaincy (SSHC) and the North Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplaincy (NSHC), we believe that God is calling us to support the spiritual well-being of patients and residents in Saskatchewan Health Authority facilities by petitioning the Government of Saskatchewan and the Saskatchewan Health Authority for the reinstatement of funding and support for Spiritual Care in the provincial health care budget.

2. Background

In March 2017, the Saskatchewan provincial budget eliminated health region funding for non-denominational Spiritual Care. This also led to the elimination of institutional patient lists used by denominational chaplains & spiritual care providers throughout the Saskatchewan Health Authority. Saskatchewan became and continues to be the only province in Canada that does not fund or administratively support Spiritual Care in health region facilities.

Evidence and experience show that Spiritual Care is an essential contributor to positive outcomes in healthcare, regardless of the patient's religious affiliation or lack there-of. Our opinion, supported by evidence from the Canadian Association of Spiritual Care (CASC) and members of the healthcare system itself, is that the removal of funding for Spiritual Care in 2017 was an error that must be corrected.

3. Theological & Ethical Rationale

As members of the United Church of Canada, we witness healing again and again in the scriptural narrative, and we are inspired by Isaiah 41:10:

"Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

Further, we understand that an essential practice of Jesus Christ's ongoing healing ministry is to provide care for the spiritual and emotional health of all people, regardless of religious affiliation and background, particularly in times of crisis and stress.

Access to professional, qualified spiritual care is a right. Currently in Saskatchewan, Spiritual Care is limited to those patients and families who are not only connected to a formal faith community, but also to a formal faith community whose care providers are within visiting distance of the health care facility. In a just system, neither of these factors should affect a patient's access to Spiritual Care.

In support of this proposal, the boards of the SSHC and NSHC have compiled an information package including letters of support from multiple health care professionals. This package is available for delivery to decision-makers in the provincial government and health region.
