In this issue Ruth Kennedy, a past president of Maritime Conference, shares some of her thoughts with us: Romans 12:6-13 reminds us to use our gifts generously and serve with genuine love. My journey with Maritime UCW from 2017 to 2025 was filled with learning, challenges, and joy. Stepping in as Vice President, I quickly found myself taking on unexpected responsibilities and learning about UCW beyond my local group.

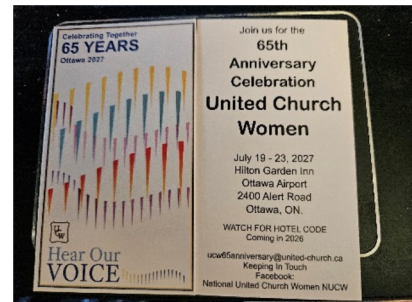

She explained that Woodstock and Oxford County are areas where trafficking young people is very high. Cara explained the dangers of those who traffic young children and what to watch for. The women were very interested and asked many questions.

After a delicious lunch served by the Centre's cook, the ladies were able to shop at the display from Five Oaks Book Store. The ladies again joined together in the singing of favourite

hymns to begin the afternoon. The Ukulele Players of the Senior Centre entertained with the playing and singing of old familiar tunes.

To end the day, Rev. Larry Schneider led us in a very inspirational communion service. The day concluded with the singing of "Go Now in Peace". Everyone travelled home, feeling happy and at peace.

This year our conference was held at the Providence Renewal Centre in Edmonton April 9 - 11. One car load travelled 500 km.





The business portion of the meeting was woven around the other activities including 3 speakers, small group discussion, and entertainment.

Since the AGM April 2025, we have Co-presidents, Karen McLennan (left) from Northern Spirit Region and Debra Logan (right) from Chinook Winds Region.

They took turns conducting the meeting. Debra also played the piano for singing.

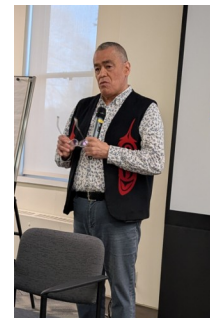
The “bring a book, take a book, & leave a donation” table was popular. The donations and the offering after the communion service were given to M&S.

The speakers were definitely the highlight of the conference. Each gave us a different perspective on Justice and Hope.

Our first speaker, Lewis Cardinal, Indigenous communicator, educator, and film producer, is the chancellor of St. Stephen’s College, Edmonton. He spoke about “Manito Asini: The Journey of the Creators Stone” a story he is making into a documentary.

In 1866, the Creators Stone, a meteor, was stolen and ended up in Ontario. Currently it is at the Royal Alberta Museum in Edmonton.

Mr. Cardinal’s documentary is about the loss and recovery of this sacred stone, a gift from the Creator, which will be completed late 2026 or early 2027.

Dr. Alison Dunwoody, recently retired from teaching Criminology and Criminal Justice programs at the University of Alberta. Her presentation “Women in Prisons in Canada” was deeply moving and upsetting at the same time.



80% of women in prison have been living in poverty; are victims of assault, violence or addictions; and have mental health issues. “This reflects a systemic societal failure. If a woman receives a mandatory 30-day sentence, she has probably lost her job, her apartment, and her children.”

An inmate reported, “You aren’t a person here. You are a risk level, a cell number, a series of tasks to be managed. The hardest part isn’t the walls; it’s the way they look through you like you’ve already disappeared from the world”.

Dr. Dunwoody said, “We need to start asking, what happens to these women who have been imprisoned?” She suggests that we support Elizabeth Fry, demand trauma informed care, support Indigenous led initiatives (like the Healing Fund) and challenge stigmas.

Our third speaker, Jonathan Mackereth, Development Officer at Bissell Centre, Edmonton, spoke about “Justice and Hope” in a different way.

Bissell Centre began 116 years ago as a Methodist Mission to help Ukrainian settlers. It has relocated and adapted many times over the century. It currently works closely with community partners like Boyle Street, the Mustard Seed, Hope Mission and Homeward Trust.

Current programs include Encampment Housing Support: Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Services: Recovery House with 24 hour staffing for sober-free living: Family Support and Child Care with free diapers, wipes and formula: Indigenous Support in Cree and English: Moonlight Bay Camp at Wabamun: Harvest Catering: Income Tax preparation and more. The whole point is to reduce barriers and form relationships.



On Saturday, our Conference ended with a communion service conducted by Rev. Chelsea Masterman from Grace United Church in Edmonton.

All our speakers received a blessing bag with their honorarium while we sang the UCW blessing for them. They were visibly moved by the gesture.

During the pandemic, the UCW of McKillop United noticed a number of unhoused community members on the streets of our city and wondered where they might be sheltering and what personal care products they would be able to access. We thought they might have need for a small bag in which to store personal effects.

In 2022, the UCW and other groups of women who had been sewing shopping bags (to replace the plastic ones) began sewing smaller lined, drawstring “blessing” bags (each with a small pocket) made from those same beautiful, donated pieces of leftover fabric.

The bags, filled with personal care products, have been given to those in need through agencies at: Women’s Shelters, Food Banks, Soup Kitchens, Indigenous Centres, the Salvation Army, Public Libraries and High Schools.

Products for the 370 plus blessing bags given away so far, have been donated or purchased with money given to the “Blessing Bag” project. The estimated value of product in each bag is

\$20.00. The bags are stuffed (at stuffing bees) with: a toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, mouthwash, comb, brush, shampoo, soap, deodorant, tissues, lip gloss, handwipes, band aids, hand sanitizer, face cloth, pair of socks, toque, mitts, energy bars, as well as sanitary supplies for women and shaving supplies for men. This summer sunscreen was added to the bags. Each bag also includes a note of encouragement and support.

Camp Shagabec Annual Women's Camp Day 2026

The UCWs from the south-west corner of Saskatchewan have an annual gathering in support of Camp Shagabec, the United Church Camp at Cypress Hills. The camp has been in operation since 1938. The UCW groups bake and freeze thousands and thousands cookies ready for the camp.

This year the gathering was in Swift Current with 62 women in attendance. The oldest woman attending was Audrey from Abby at 91. At 90 she stepped down as treasurer. Audrey had served on the UCW convening committee in the 90's. The three of us from Saskatoon were recognized as we had travelled the furthest.

Coffee, tea and homemade cinnamon buns greeted us when we arrived. To serve as a mixer, each name tag was colour coded to a table. It was a wonderful way to meet new people or reconnect with someone who you hadn't seen for awhile. I was fortunate to be seated next to Audrey who I had met last year.

The first activity we were led in was some gentle stretching exercises a lot of which could be done while seated if desired. After having been in the vehicle for 3 1/2 hours it was the perfect way to get body and mind ready for the day.

The guest speaker was Deanna Baje, Director of the Southwest Newcomers Welcome Centre. Based in Swift Current the centre works with refugees and immigrants to provide them with the settlement and integration services they need to make a home. In 2025 they assisted 372 people from 37 countries. This number doesn't reflect the children or other family members who are partnered with the refugee. Deanne Baje came to Canada as an immigrant herself. One thing that stood out to me is they do tours to parts of the region to help participants to get to know more about where they are living. They tour the River Landing, the Sandhills, East End's T.Rex Discovery Centre, and Cypress Hills.

I brought greetings from Saskatchewan United Church of Canada Women Network and from National UCW. I shared information about the UCW 65th Anniversary Celebration in Ottawa in 2027. Information cards and Bursary forms were left with the attendees. Two women completed bursary forms and submitted them on the spot.

The ladies provided a beautiful lunch with more than a dozen salads along a build your own sandwiches buffet and offered cake, ice cream and fruit for dessert.

Several times throughout the day, we joined in singing camp songs. A very appropriate activity for a camp focused day. This united us in a wonderful way as many of us attended various United Church camps throughout Saskatchewan.

The afternoon opened up with a skit which introduced our activity. We made a spice mix called Cowboy Butter. We all came away with our own jar of the spice mix. Doing this was a great opportunity to move around, laugh and chat.

We moved into the business part of the day, the meeting, a report on Camp Shagabec and a discussion about next year. The Memorial service honoured the women that passed away this past year in the region. The minister, Rev Kelly Osgood, of First United Church led us in worship and communion.

After a delicious supper, the group was given many in-door craft options that included rock painting, prayer rock poem, constructing a pocketful of positives and friendship bracelets. We had an indoor campfire with songs and skits that evening. Special on going skit was a visit the “Aunties” from Usbekistanestonia.



Waking up to a bright sunshiny day we headed to the dining hall where a scrumptious breakfast awaited. Two special birthdays were recognized with unique pancakes served by the "Aunties". Chair Yoga was led by Ruth Griffith. Worship and Communion followed at the campfire pit. Samantha Clayton officiated at the outdoor communion service. Susan Dokken led the worship service based on Psalm 100 as the scripture – Make a Joyful Noise. She then went on to give the "Gratitude Reflection". Following worship we had time to continue working on crafts, play board games, work on puzzles or go for a walk. Throughout the two days the Silent Auction remained set up and bidding continued in earnest for some specific items. After lunch there were games and skits and again a visit by the "Aunties". Before leaving for home snacks were provided and a closing prayer service was held outdoors. The Silent Auction closed with over \$360.00 raised for Camp Tapawingo.

“Bloom Where You Are Planted” UCW Gathering/AGM April 2026

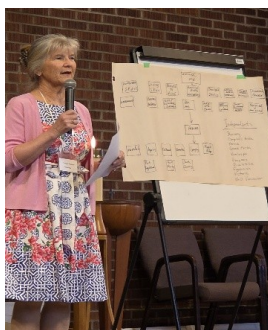
Fifty -seven women attended the Gathering hosted by Golden Ears UCW, Maple Ridge BC. The hymns, worship, table settings, and games supported the theme. The highlight of the day Presenter Bob Peragallo, who as a young man served in the USA Armed Forces during the Vietnam war. Here he learned to “bloom” where he was planted. Bob came to Canada in 1988 and settled in Maple Ridge, BC. Topics discussed included the revision of the BC 2020 Temporary Food Markets Guidelines which would curtail the production of lower risk foods (baking, jams, jellies, relishes, etc) in home kitchens.

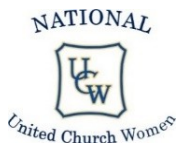
